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My blurb:

What I find interesting and worth studying is how language functions in interpersonal relationships and face-to-face communication; how culture, understood as a contextually mediated set of assumptions, values and attitudes informs males's and females' linguistic choices and choice assessments; and how all that relates to what is called 'politeness', 'impoliteness', 'facework' or 'self-presentation'. I think that all those questions - and answers, however partial – may be relevant for people in many walks of life.
